### 6 A - Oakland Schools Budget Designates Meeting

Per the Michigan School Code, Section 380.624(2), the Oakland Schools budget must be presented to Oakland County's 28 school district's by May 1 each year. Accordingly, the fiscal year 2012-13 proposed budget documents will be delivered to all 28 school districts board offices. Each district will receive three copies; a copy for the Superintendent, Board Designate and Business Manager.

No later than June 1 of each year, the board of each constituent district shall review the proposed intermediate school district budget, shall adopt a board resolution expressing its support for or disapproval of the proposed intermediate school district budget, and shall submit to the intermediate school board any specific abjections and proposed changes the constituent district board has to the budget. If an intermediate school board receives any specific objections or proposed changes, the intermediate school board shall consider the proposed budget changes.

The Oakland Schools Board of Education will hold a **Designates Meeting on Wednesday May 9 at 6:30 pm in Oakland Schools**, providing local board designates and district administrative staff an opportunity to review the budget prior to submitting their board resolution on or before June 1.

The Oakland Schools Board of Education will hold a Truth in Budgeting hearing on June 11, and will consider the FY2013 proposed budget documents for approval during its regular meeting that night. 






### Policy Prohibiting Bulying and Other Aggressive Behavior




### Bullying

- Every 7 minutes a child is bullied.
- 1 in 7 students is either a bully or a victim of bullying.
- 160,000 students stay home from school every day for fear of bullying.
- 1 out of every 10 students drops out or changes schools because of bullying.




# What Bullying Can Do:

## Buly Prevention

- Wilkinson Middle School Bully Prevention team has produced and implemented the use of several documents to monitor and track bullying/behavior issues
- Our goal is to track and reduce the number of bullying incidents in the school.



## Buly Prevention


- asked to list bullying behaviors and develop a rubric of address bullying behavior, staff were surveyed and In order to encourage staff to clearly identify and different hostile and aggressive acts.
- Staff were then asked to decide what consequences would be appropriate consequences for different behaviors.
- Consequences become more serious if the student repeats the same behaviors.



The rubric engages staff and allows for a consensus on what behaviors violate school codes and what appropriate punishments should be.

This process ideally allows staff to take ownership for the discipline policy

as a united team, they can more effectively address and We know that if staff are consistent in enforcing rules prevent bullying in the classrooms and hallways.





## Bully Prevention


The program involves:

- Prevention: students see constant reminders of what constitutes bullying and the consequences
- behavior in a consistent manner that has been agreed upon by Staff are invested and engaged in intervening in bullying the staff as a whole, encouraging follow-through and appropriate, timely response
- Consequences: consequences are clearly laid out and understood by both students and staff.
- Tracking: bullying behavior is monitored and kept in a central location so that staff are aware of the number of incidents of bullying involving each student.




